BRUW INTRODUCES THE BASICS TO GEORGETOWN AND WILLIAMSBURG COUNTIES

80% of brain growth happens in the first three years of life. Making the most of this critical time in a child's development is a top priority for parents, caregivers, educators, and health professionals alike. Yet, understanding exactly how to make the most of this time can be overwhelming.

To give every child a great start in life, we just need The Basics! The Basics are five fun, free, and simple principles that help children thrive:



By implementing The Basics Principles, parents, caregivers, and community members can promote the early learning and brain development of children ages 0-4, making the most of this critical time in a child's life.

Black River United Way, in partnership with United Way of Horry County, is a part of The Basics Movement, working through The Basics Waccamaw to improve the number of children in the tri-county area who are developmentally on track and entering kindergarten ready.

Our strategy is to bring a public health perspective to encourage enriched childhood brain development during the early stages of life. We focus on family and community– from parents and caregivers to community support systems outside of the home – while incorporating the latest research to identify disparities and implement innovative solutions.

In March 2024, we introduced The Basics to our community through launch events in Georgetown and Williamsburg Counties, featuring a screening and facilitated discussion of the film "No Small Matter".



MISSION: READY

3RD ANNUAL KINDERWAVES MAKES A SPLASH IN SCHOOL READINESS

BRUW's 3rd Annual KinderWaves Kindergarten Transition Camp took place June 10th - 13th at 6 local elementary schools, with 42 pre-K children. Through the theme of an oceanic safari, KinderWaves introduced local pre-K students to a love of reading, structured classroom

settings, science and mathematical thinking, hands-on learning activities, and relationship building. The camp ended with a family fun day at Beck Recreation Center featuring a stilt-walker and balloon artist, a hands-on tour of a fire truck from the Georgetown Fire Department, snow cones from the Georgetown County Sherriff's Department, free concessions, and a Triple P Parenting Workshop parenting class.

PROMOTING POSITIVE PARENTING THROUGH TRIPLE P

Triple P (the Positive Parenting Program) is one of the most trusted parenting programs across the globe, utilized in over 30 countries. This evidence based program is a parenting and family support system designed to prevent and treat behavioral and emotional problems in children up to the age of 12.

Black River United Way has been able to offer this program to our community since 2019, thanks to the partnership of the Children's Trust of South Carolina.



In 2023-2024, BRUW provided Triple P parenting classes to 115 caregivers!

BRUW AMERICORPS PROGRAM CONCLUDES AFTER NINE SUCCESSFUL YEARS OF IMPACT

Since 2015, Black River United Way has been the recipient of an AmeriCorps South Carolina grant, providing an opportunity for AmeriCorps Members to serve Georgetown and Williamsburg counties. After nine successful years of impact, in July BRUW's AmeriCorps program focused on early literacy reached its conclusion. Through AmeriCorps SC, Black River United Way leveraged:

- \$969,248 in matching funds to generate \$2.68 MM in program support
- 204 AmeriCorps Members to serve at 12 elementary schools, 2 child development centers, and 5 after school programs
- 76,140.75 hours of volunteer time to tutor 1,479 students, improving 576 to reading on or above grade level and supporting 541 students' academic improvement in reading

We are so grateful for our incredible partnership with the AmeriCorps South Carolina Program and the South Carolina Service Commission. Though these funding partnerships have ended, their impact lives on through each child supported to third grade reading success.

INTRODUCING HEROES FOR LITERACY

In September, we launched Heroes For Literacy, a program that continues our efforts to provide support to struggling readers in K-3rd grades. Heroes For Literacy (H4L) is an initiative where community members dedicate 1.5 hours each week for nine weeks to tutor children in reading. 19 Heroes were recruited, and trained to volunteer in 6 local elementary schools across Georgetown and Williamsburg Counties during Fall 2024. STOPPING THE "SUMMER SLIDE" - SUMMER LEARNING LOSS PREVENTED THROUGH SUMMER SAIL PROGRAM

Black River United Way hosted its annual summer enrichment program, Summer SAIL, in partnership with Tidelands Health and Brown's Ferry Outreach from June 4 to June 26, 2024. Through the Summer SAIL (Science And Inquiry Learning) Program, community volunteers and local elementary schools work with students to maintain their skills and competencies in reading and math over the summer, eliminating summer learning loss. 32 students in Kindergarten through 5th grade were assisted through the four week program. Students were assessed at the beginning and the end of the program in math and reading. Student assessments showed a 1.5% improvement on average over the summer, demonstrating the effectiveness of Summer SAIL in stopping the "summer slide".

UNITED TO READ



United to Read is an annual reading event where volunteers read to elementary school children. In 2024, 92 volunteers read to over 3,000 children in pre-K, 1st, 2nd, and Special Education classes across Georgetown and Williamsburg County School Districts.

OLIVIA'S STORY*

Imagine the despair of a child who believes that he or she cannot read. For too many young students, this untrue belief is their reality.

Dorothy Thornal, an AmeriCorps member working in Black River United Way's literacy tutoring program, is very familiar with children that lack confidence in their reading ability. Children, like Olivia.

"Olivia came to me this year with no self confidence. Every time we read, looked at sight words or learned something new, she would say she couldn't do that. She thought all the other students knew more than she did. She would put her head on the table and cry".

Many students like Olivia require extra support in reading. Through Black River United Way's Mission: Read initiative, children like Olivia are able to receive that extra support from trained volunteer literacy specialists like Miss Dorothy. In partnership with our local schools, Black River United Way empowers volunteers to help students improve literacy skills such as fluency, vocabulary, and reading comprehension. Beyond helping children overcome early grade reading struggles, this support can increase a child's confidence in literacy, helping them challenge untrue beliefs about their own reading ability.

For Olivia, Miss Dorothy had a big role in helping her challenge the belief that she couldn't read.

"[Olivia] is doing a great job sounding out words and her reading skills have greatly improved.... But most importantly, she was proud of her work." "We all encouraged her. She began to focus on what she could do and not what she couldn't do." Since Miss Dorothy began working with Olivia, not only have her skills improved, but most of all her confidence has increased. "She is doing a great job sounding out words and her reading skills have greatly improved. She is enjoying her time with me. She wrote me a nice letter to Santa and she illustrated it very well. But, most importantly, she was proud of her work."

With the skills, support, and confidence she needs, 1st grader Olivia is well on her way to becoming a thriving reader. Stories like Olivia's illustrate the importance of our bold goal for early childhood success - that by 2031, 90% of students in Georgetown and Williamsburg Counties are reading on or above grade level by the end of the third grade.

With your support, Black River United Way is moving our community towards this goal one child, and one story at a time. Through your partnership, BRUW is leading the charge to meet early childhood needs with strategies to close the reading gap, increase family engagement, eliminate summer learning loss, and improve kindergarten readiness.


HELPING GEORGETOWN & WILLIAMSBURG COUNTIES "BE READY!" FOR DISASTER

Black River United Way is the lead agency of the Winyah Bay COAD (Community Organizations Active in Disaster) / Long-Term Recovery Group, spearheading the effort to help our community "Be Ready" for disaster and activating at the speed of need when our residents are impacted.

Through our leadership of the COAD, we leverage our community networks to facilitate compassionate, comprehensive aid, ensuring all human needs are met. See below activation chart to understand how we partner during disaster.

2023-2024 BE READY! IMPACT

- Equipped 824 students to "Be Ready!" for disaster through training and disaster starter kits through partnership with DSM-Firmenich and Georgetown County EMD.
- Collaborated with the Georgetown County EMD to conduct the WB COAD's first Hurricane Table Top Exercise to prepare for disaster.
- Utilized the COAD's training and collaboration to save a home from mold damage during a severe weather event.





MEET "ALICE"

For a growing number of U.S. households, financial stability is out of reach, no matter how hard their members work. These households are **ALICE** – **Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed** – earning above the Federal Poverty Level yet struggling to afford basic expenses.

Black River United Way is advancing work with these households by funding our community's access to data on ALICE in Georgetown and Williamsburg Counties. Additionally, BRUW's 211 and Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP) support ALICE households by connecting families with resources and funding local agencies providing basic needs.


Many of our neighbors are ALICE, with 30% of households in Georgetown County, and 32% of households in Williamsburg County meeting the definition of ALICE. Below is a snapshot of Poverty and ALICE. Household totals in Georgetown and Williamsburg Counties. Since 2010, the number of ALICE households as a percentage of total households remains unchanged, yet the total number of ALICE households increased.




Key Finding #1: Financial Hardship Has Changed Over Time

UNITED FOR ALICE

By total number, groups with the largest population of households below the ALICE Threshold tend to also be in the largest demographic groups. However, when looking at the proportion of each group that is below the ALICE Threshold, it is clear that some groups are more likely to be ALICE than others.
